Elizabeth's first officer position was the photographer and historian of her 4-H club. She was terrified of this job because it required her to stand in front of the group to take the pictures! All she could think of was the dozens of eyes watching her, examining her every move. Wow! What a change from how she is today! Now she not only stands in

front of the club, but leads the meetings as president. No longer afraid to be the center of attention, she loves to speak in public.

Although Elizabeth did not realize it at the time, there was a reason she had such difficulty with public speaking and self-confidence. Two summers ago, Elizabeth was

diagnosed with Auditory Processing Disorder (APD), a learning disability that affects the brain's ability to process verbal information. Because of this disorder, she has fought a life-long battle to become the confident, friendly individual she is now. I credit 4-H with bringing out the bold determination hidden deep inside her quietness. As she took on harder officer positions with more responsibilities, she was required to speak in public. This year, Elizabeth combined her interest in Auditory Processing Disorder with

her talent for public speaking. She researched in depth about APD so that she could give a speech about APD at a State Roundup contest. She was thrilled to advance to the final round in that competition, receiving tenth place out of twenty-seven speeches! In addition to that speech, she also gave a dramatic interpretation for Share-the-Fun in Poetry/Prose category. She adapted her presentation from Lois Lowry's book Number the Stars.
