District 10 is planning an awesome conference and I hope everyone will make plans to attend and enjoy this beautiful and fun area of the state.

Administration and Specialist Visits

In March, your officers had the opportunity meet with the Texas AgriLife Extension Administration and the FDRM and Nutrition Extension Specialists. Dr. Smith, Mr. Smith, Dr. McGee, Dr. Gibbs, and Dr. Dromgoole visited with us about agency funding, fee based funding, ENP, the 1890s program, and FCS visibility. In the afternoon we met with 18 specialists in FDRM and Nutrition. We learned about grant programs that they are working on and also new programming initiatives.

PILD Conference

In April, Diana Weise and I attended the JCEPs Public Issues Leadership Development conference in Washington D. C. The conference was excellent as the conference focused on the USDA and NIFA impact on Extension, Branding and Marketing of Extension. It was also a good opportunity to meet with NIFA specialists and six of our states U. S. Representatives.

A most impacting and powerful speaker was Dr. Marshal Stewart, Associate Direc-



tor, North Carolina Cooperative Extension Service. He spoke on Impact Counts: Telling the Cooperative Extension Story. This is in regards talking to elected officials, stake holders and supporters of Extension. He emphasized the 3 "knows" and the 3 "be's."

Know who you are. Have clarity in your message. Use common lan-

guage. Be concise. Have your stump speech, have your elevator pitch. Protect those above you. Connect your priorities with their priorities.

When speaking to people about Extension, three areas have an impact: Economy – the benefits and value, Education – what was learned, and Health and Well-Being.

Know who you are talking to. Politics are about relationships. It is about who you know. All politics is local. Make friends when you don't need them, so that you will have them when you do need them. Always be thankful.

Know what is important to them. Know their interests. Do your homework about that person. Remember this is not about you, this is about them. Find something or someone that you have in common. Utilize volunteer advocates from the area that they represent. Training and preparation is the key. Figure out where the real power is. It could be a staffer, a friend or family member. Know how to make your issue their issue.

Be flexible. Politics is about compromise. Politics is about negotiation. Make sure you ask for enough.

Be relentless. Understand the importance of re-election. It is all about re-election. If you do not run, you can win. If you don't win, you can't govern. You have a network (asset) that they see could be beneficial to them. Follow the money. Review the campaign reports to see who has their interests. **Be honest.** Do not lie or stretch the truth. Be factual. Don't over compromise. Don't commit someone else unless you are 111% sure of their agreement. Don't agree to something you are not comfortable with.

He asked 2 important questions: How many of you know your legislatures? How many legislatures know you.

It is equally important for you to know them and for them to know you.

Proposed Bylaw Changes

Proposed Changes to the

BY-LAWS of the TEXAS EXTENSION ASSOCIATION OF FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCES

The Bylaws Committee submits the following changes for consideration by the association membership. These changes will be voted upon at the Annual Business Meeting in July in Fredericksburg, Texas.

Article XVII – Amendments: "By-laws may be amended at any annual or special meeting by a two-thirds vote provided notice of the proposed amendment is published 30 days prior to the meeting at which said amendment is to be voted upon."

Article V – Officers

Section III - Term of Office

CURRENT: B. The First Vice President, Second Vice-President, and Secretary shall be elected annually to serve for one year.

PROPOSED: B. The Second Vice President shall be elected annually to serve a one year term.

RATIONALE: To include change in election of officers as listed in Article V. Section III C.

Article V – Officers

Section III - Term of Office

CURRENT: C. The Treasurer shall be elected in the even number years to serve a term of two years.

PROPOSED: C. The First Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected in even numbered years to serve a term of two years.

RATIONALE: To provide stability and continuity of the offices listed above.

Article V – Officers

Section V – Duties of Officers

D. First Vice-President Shall:

CURRENT: 3. Receives all state and national award applications on or before February 15. PROPOSED: 3. Receive all state and national award applications on or before national or state deadlines.

RATIONALE: To include any changing dates on the state or national level now and in the future.

Article VII – Board of Directors CURRENT: Section I – The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, President-Elect, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, 4-H Foundation Representative, and *Texas Extra* Editor. The Past President shall be an ex-officio member of the board and shall serve as parliamentarian and coordinator of the retiree recognition.

PROPOSED: Section I – The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, President-Elect, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, 4-H Foundation Representative, Historian and *Texas Extra* Editor. The Past President shall be an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors and shall serve as parliamentarian and coordinator of the retiree recognition. RATIONALE: To include appointed office of Historian in the Executive Committee.

Article VIII – Executive Committee CURRENT: Section I - The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, President-Elect, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, 4-H Foundation Representative, and *Texas Extra* Editor. The Past President shall be an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors and shall serve as parliamentarian and coordinator of the retiree recognition.

PROPOSED: Section I - The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, President-Elect, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, 4-H Foundation Representative, Historian and *Texas Extra* Editor. The Past President shall be an ex-officio member of the board and shall serve as parliamentarian and coordinator of the retiree recognition.

RATIONALE: To include appointed office of Historian in Executive Committee.

Article VIII – Executive Committee CURRENT: Section V – There is NO section V currently.

PROPOSED: Section V – The Historian shall serve a two-year term, and may serve no more than two consecutive terms. They must be a member of TEAFCS, but do not have to have prior board experience. Interested members must complete an application and the Historian will be appointed by the President. In the event of a vacancy in the position during the term of office, the President will appoint a qualified member to fill the unexpired term.

RATIONALE: To include the appointed office of Historian in the Executive Committee and provide guidelines for the office.

Article XII - Scholarships

CURRENT: Section I - The Ann Sonner Scholarship applications are submitted to the TEAFCS Association Awards Coordinator no later than February 15.

PROPOSED: Section I – The Ann Sonner Scholarship applications are submitted to the First Vice President no later than the state deadline. RATIONALE: To include any changing dates on the state level now and in the future and to list awards chair by proper Board title.



HIGHLIGHTS FROM AROUND THE STATE

District 1

In Donley County, Andrea Stelting sponsored the annual Health Fair, which was a great success. Thirty-one vendors provided information ranging from diabetes, home health, local and area medical services, health care plans and other valuable resources available to the public. Free screenings were done for all participants. The Department of State Health Services measured participants Body Mass Index (BMI), the Lion's Eye Bank offered glaucoma screenings. Clarendon Family Medical Center, local EMT's and Northwest Texas Hospital hosted a free blood screening for all participants. The screenings available saved Donley County residents \$82.00 individually for an overall total of \$16.400.00. A host of volunteers from the Clarendon Senior Citizen's, Clarendon College and Hall/Donley Farm Bureau helped make this event possible. Two hundred and two residents attended this event.

A Child Safety Seat Checkup event was held April 14 in Spearman under the direction of CEA Peggy Winegarner to call attention to the need for the proper use of child safety seats. Three certified technicians including Myrna Hill, Bev Kellner, and Shonna Covin, were on hand to oversee the event and performed 23 inspections. Although most children arrived at the event in a safety seat, none of them arrived correctly restrained. All of the children left safer than they arrived, with their parents grateful for the education they received. Many thanks to the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department for the use of their facility and to the 7 volunteers who made the day run smoothly.

Molly Forman, Briscoe and Hall County Extension agent, provided a poison prevention program for elementary students in Silverton, Valley, and Memphis. There were a total of 450 students that attended individual class sessions. First, the classes discussed the definitions

and differences in the words Caution, Danger, and Poisonous. Then clear cups with sealed lids were presented to the students. They could not smell the contents in the containers. The students were asked question on what they thought might be in the containers. They were asked if the item were a poison or if the contents were something that we could eat or drink. The items were look-a-likes such as syrup and motor oil, water and rubbing alcohol, apple juice and pine sol. We discussed the effects that poisons can cause if inhaled or ingested. Handouts were provided to students to take home and share with parents. Also handouts were provided to teachers with activities they could take back to their classroom.

In Carson County, Jeanene Montgomery conducted a Stitching Station Workshop, to enhance 4-H members with some basic learning skills they could use from now on. 4-H members learned the basics of sewing on a button, sewing a hem by using a whip stitch; learned how to apply Lite Steam-A-Seam 2 to fabric for preparation of appliquéing onto a T-Shirt; make a decorative hair bow with ribbon; and learned how to make a pin cushion using a jar lid and ring. The 4-H members also had a sewing trivia game on how many sewing notions they could identify.

District 2

Terry County 4-H Monkey Playground Grand Opening

2011 in Brownfield. This playground, designed
for children age 2 to 5 years old, was the vision
of a 4-H member, Landon Bradley, who wanted
a safe place for his younger brother to play.

At a Brownfield Town Hall meeting in 2007, then 10-year old Landon outlined his idea of a playground for the City Council and the many residents in attendance. He stepped up and not only presented his request, but also detailed his plans to raise money for the equipment. He worked with Mary Collier, CEA-FCS/4-H Coordinator, to gather a committee, the Money 4 Monkey's Committee, to help with this 4-H community service project.

Landon and the committee members worked together to contact local businesses, organizations and individuals to ask for their support of the project. The playground served to be a unifying force for the community as many people donated time, money, labor, and other resources. The County provided the property and the City provided the ground covering for the playground. More than 50 other families and businesses contributed to the project.

This new play area is located at the Family Fitness Park that includes a walking track, exercise equipment and ADA-compliant picnic table. It was important for Landon that the playground be ADA-compliant so that all young children could have a place to play.

The playground is located in a residential area, and many children watched anxiously as it was constructed. The Grand Opening was a wonderful new beginning for them and a satisfying conclusion to this 4-H community service project

These questions and many more were answered through Terry County Community Adult Resource Education (C.A.R.E.) workshops held in Brownfield. Mary Collier, Terry County FCS Agent scheduled speakers and host church locations for the following workshops:

- * Alzheimer's Disease Q&A
- * How to Qualify for Governmental Services
- * Practical Legal Aspects of Aging
- * Senior Companion Program and We Care

Each workshop was held from 11:30 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. at a different church. Attendees brought a sack lunch and each church provided drinks. Approximately thirty people attended each workshop. The evaluations completed at the final workshop indicated that each session was valuable to the audience. It has been requested that the workshops be repeated so that others may attend. Additional sessions covering diabetes education, other governmental programs available, and budget management have been requested and will be held in the fall of 2011.

This effort between the adults education program and Extension service is expanded by the participation of adult education staff in the Better Living for Texans taskforce. This was quiet an honor for us to be nominated and recognized by Weatherford ISD as well as the Texas Community Education Association It great to have the best BLT Assistant and a great group of community support.

Parker County Extension Agents Kayla Neill, Jon Green and Kathy Smith hosted an Adventure Camp during Spring Break. The adventure camp featured outdoor and indoor activities including building a tent, using a compass, making leaf prints, knot tying, first aid, and various other activities. The three day camp reached 24 very active youth. The class will be held again in July.

Knox County

Knox County had a very successful Child Safety Seat Checkup Event in April, checking 38 seats and distributing 28 new seats to families in need. Overall, 74 people attended and received education to make the children of Knox County safer when they travel.

Also, Texas AgriLife Extension Service, Knox County, in conjunction with the Knox County Visioning Team recently completed the second in a series of 6 educational workshops for small business development. Lorrie Coop CEA-FCS, conducted Texas Friendly Hospitality Training for 13 local business owners and employees to help them improve their businesses. This was the first time this program has been offered in the county and it was well received. Plans are being made to offer it in June to youth who will be seeking summer employment.

Haskell County

Texas Extension Education Association (TEEA)

in Haskell County sponsored a Pie Baking Contest as part of the "Texas Independence Day - Haskell County Style" Celebration on March 5th. Many local bakers entered their favorite pie recipes which were judged by a panel of local experts. Following the announcement of winners, the public had an opportunity to purchase the pies by the slice or the entire pie.

In addition to the Pie Baking Contest, a celebrity "Pie Challenge" was conducted. Patterned after the 4-H Food Challenge, the Mayor of Haskell and Haskell County Commissioner - Pct. 3 matched up in the challenge. Spectators watched the heated competition that served the purpose of interpreting one of the new 4-H project opportunities to the public.

They had so much fun shopping, they didn't want to leave the store! Upon returning to the Extension Office, the 4-H'ers wrote a de-

scription of their selected garment, and prepared for a fashion show.

After lunch, 4-H'ers were given several make-and-take fleece projects from which to select. Projects include "Scarf Safari", "Handprint scarf", toboggans, and no-tye pillows. With the assistance from FCS 4 -H Coalition members and volunteers, each 4-H'er completed at least two projects. A fun time was had by all – including Johanna!



Master Wellness Volunteer Training

Wenhsing Cheng, Dallas County, Carrie Brazeal, Collin County, and Lexie McGrane, Rockwall County, joined forces to conduct Master Wellness Volunteer Training that took place at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Urban Solutions Center in Dallas. Twenty-nine volunteers received 40 hours of education in health and wellness. All passed their certification exam in March and will pay back 40 hours of service. These volunteers consist of retired teachers, health care professionals, worksite wellness staff, community volunteers, Master Gardeners, Master Naturalists, a Lifestyle Coach, etc. One volunteer shared her success story with Wenhsing two weeks after the training and said, "I have changed my eating habits for the bet-

ter and I always thought I was a health nut before:)... I am down 3 pounds which is great and my husband is eating healthier too. We hardly eat salt now, no desserts when at home, 2 veggies a night now even if it just added baby carrots to dinner and almost all whole grains."





Mini-PRIDE

Wenhsing Cheng, Dallas County, partnered with Carrie Brazeal, Collin County, and Maggie Jover, Denton County, to conduct monthly Mini-PRIDE Training for foster parents of their relative children. Since January, fifty-one parents completed the 8-hour training that addressed topics ranging from attachment issues, loss issues, effects of abuse and neglect, sexual abuse, and the effects on the family of fostering and adopting. Also, Wenhsing Cheng facilitated a Spanish Mini-PRIDE Training with five parents in attendance. Mini-PRIDE is a joint effort between Extension and the DFPS.

Marilyn Simmons County Extension Agent - FCS Galveston County

In January of 2009, Rozzie Cloud, Nutrition Educator for Dickinson ISD attended the Galveston County *Better Living for Texans* Advisory Committee meeting for the first time. She was not familiar with Texas AgriLife Extension Service and was surprised to learn what BLT offered for parents, students, and staff. From that initial introduction to BLT, we now provide a monthly one page nutrition newsletter (one side in English the other in Spanish) for students and their parents in eight elementary schools. We also merge resources to provide evaluation series classes during the fall and spring semesters for parents and nutrition activities for children.

The joint venture between Galveston County BLT and Dickinson ISD Child Nutrition was written about in the April 2011 edition of *TASNews*, a publication of the Texas Association for School Nutrition. It was suggested in the article that if a school district needed assistance with nutrition education that they contact their local County Extension Agent for Family and Consumer Sciences.

Our success with the Dickinson ISD has encouraged other school districts to discuss options for collaboration. We look forward to future doors opening and to the opportunities ahead.

District 11

Ninety-seven parents from Mathis, Taft, Sinton, Aransas Pass, Rockport, and Orange Grove participated in the "To Educate is to Communicate"

Building Self-Sufficient Families Annual Parenting Conference. Topics included: "Bullying," "Parents Taking Back Control," "Smart Snacking"



and "Healthy Relationships." 100% of the Conference participants planned to adopt at least one concept learned during the conference. One participant commented that she was glad that she had the opportunity to attend the conference because it really was very helpful and informative.

Over one hundred participants attended the 1st Annual Pink Event Friend to Friend Party & Luncheon. Darlene Menn presented the keynote address on the importance of a Mam-



mogram and Pap test. It was stressed that early detection was the key to survival. Table monitors led discussions about the importance of screening. Participants were encouraged to sign commitment cards stating when they planned to get their screenings completed. Twenty-two exhibitors provided information about women's health issues. Participants received free blood pressure checks, body mass index and bone density screenings.

In coordination with Dr. Jenna Anding, a task force consisting of Vince Mannino, Maria Rangel, Sandy Fry, Shari Grahman, Sharon Trower, Diana Weise, Kathy Farrow, Sally Garrett, Jenifer Boening, and Marilyn Simmons planned and are currently conducting a South Region pilot project for Home Food Preservation. Ten agents have agreed to participate in the pilot to test materials with clientele and provide feedback in order to be able to provide training and materials to agents statewide. Participating agents include Liz Trejo, Courtney LaTour, Tonya Poncik, Lindy Pitre, Meredith Henry, Linda Mock, Julie Ketelsen, Janis Pfeffer, Amy Glen-O'Brien, and

On April 18, 2011 Jenifer Boening, Fayette County Program Assistant-FCS and Sally Garrett, Favette County Extension Agent-FCS conducted a 2 hour child care curriculum training workshop for 8 county child care providers on Color Me Healthy. Color Me Healthy, a preschool curriculum developed by NC Cooperative Extension & NC Division of Public Health, is designed to reach children ages 4 and 5. The curriculum provides fun, innovative, interactive learning opportunities on physical activity and healthy eating. This program is designed to stimulate all of the senses of young children: touch, smell, sight, sound, and taste. Through the use of color, music and exploration of the senses the curriculum teaches children that healthy food and physical activity are fun. One activity demonstrated how the providers could use classroom cooking activities with the children so that they could create their own healthy and fun personal pizzas. A variety of vegetables, low fat cheeses and meats were provided.

message the children are learning in the classroom and parent posters. The newsletters are designed to provide families information on healthy eating and physical activity such as how families can be active together or how to encourage more fruit and vegetable consumption.

The students learned the purpose of every piece of tableware and specifically when to use each plate, fork, spoon, etc. Agent Salinas really enjoyed this program and state "I enjoyed watching these young children learn how to set a table, and set their utensils in the correct order. They practiced the use of a napkin, and passing the salt and

pepper shakers as well as the bread rolls. Watching them butter there rolls with pure concentration and poise was very amusing and they were just too cute. We emphasized tearing off an appropriate size suitable for their small mouths and they did so with such ease." The agent worked with 19 students; 4 Pre-K and 15 Kindergarten. An evening setting was established and the students were informed that they would be learning how to properly act during an evening of dinner and dance. All the students were asked to dress in their Sunday's Best and their evening of dinner and dance took place during Lunch and PE.
