




## Rangeland Marginalization Confirmed

UN sanctioned report 'A Case of Benign Neglect' confirms the marginalization or devaluation of global rangelands.

#### Insufficient information to:

- Define scope and extent
- > Determine current status
- > Future stewardship needs
- > Implement required action






# Forest vs. Rangeland Value?

### Food and Agriculture Organization

- ➤ Global Forest Reassessment 2020
- > Referenced to a 1990 baseline
- Multiple metrics of national and global forests provided
- Comparable rangelands assessment does not exit
- Rangeland Atlas (2021) is an important first step





# **Costs of Marginalization Narrative**


- ➤ Biodiversity and associated ecosystem services become externalities in land use change.
- ➤ They are unrecognized or undervalued relative to a few select provisioning services.
  - ✓ Wildlife loss in response to private land tenure
  - ✓ Loss of key resource areas to agriculture
- Creates opportunities for land acquisition (grabs) by powerful national or international actors.
  - ✓ Often for purposes of resource exploitation
  - ✓ Indigenous peoples often disadvantaged



# Origin Marginalization Narrative

- ➤ Origin traced to European scholars that interpreted rangelands as a consequence of forest degradation by indigenous pastoralists, rather than climatic conditions mid-19<sup>th</sup> century.
- Narrative spread throughout global during colonial period.



# Narrative deeply embedded within the global rangeland community

- > Restrictive rangeland definitions
- Misunderstanding of pastoralism
- Rangeland development programs
- Rangeland omission from structure of intergovernmental organizations
  - ✓ Agriculture
  - ✓ Forestry
  - ✓ Livestock





## **Power of Narratives**

## Narratives represent the default mode of human thought

- Approximations of how humans interact with nature; their legitimacy is based on the *appearance* of truth.
- > Provides meaning to real-world events *without specific* argument or evidence.
- Narratives are very *difficult* to counter with facts and evidence.

## **Historical Chronicle**

#### Historical chronical of the Dust Bowl

- ➤ Immigrants encouraged to settle Great Plains (1862-1909)
- > Agriculture flourished throughout the 1920s
- > Severe drought produced human exodus (1930s)
- Re-populated with government support (1940s-)

## **Dust Bowl Narrative**

Drought on the Plains was a formidable antagonists to the advance of civilization, but perseverance and ingenuity ensured human triumph.

- Narrative provides the *plot* for a compelling interpretation of events
- > Human centered
- > Inconsistencies discounted

# **Attitudes Not Always Logical**

Attitudes – disposition toward a topic or issue.


- Belief is object specific without emotion
- > Affect is an irrational (emotional) component

Affect is stronger than belief so evidence alone does

not change attitude.

Affect strongest when based on *identity* and *experience*.

Narratives may be a solution.





# **Powerful Counter Narrative Required**

# "Only way to counter a negative narrative is with a positive narrative" – B.T. Bestelmeyer

- Counter narrative to 'balance of nature' has developed within ecology the past 5 decades
  - ✓ Non-equilibrium is now widely referenced
- ➤ 'Good Anthropocene' developed to counter narrative of a dystopian future.
  - ✓ Seeds of Good Anthropocene initiative (Bennett 2016).



## **Got Counter Narratives?!?!**

- Rangeland definition
  - ✓ More encompassing
- Diverse pastoral societies
  - ✓ Rich cultural diversity
- > Ecosystem services value
  - ✓ Biodiversity most critical
- Planetary scale essential
  - ✓ Biosphere in the balance







## **Potential Counter Narrative**

## Traditional rangeland definitions

- ➤ Uncultivated land that provides the necessities of life for grazing and browsing animals (Holechek et al. 2011).
- An area where wild and domestic animals graze or browse on uncultivated vegetation (FAO 2000).

## More inclusive rangeland definition

Human dominated ecosystems supporting native or naturalized vegetation .... managed as complex adaptive systems to provision multiple ecosystem services to benefit human well-being (Briske 2017).



# **Pastoral History and Diversity**

### Pastoral Origins

- > 10,000 YA, Holocene warming, Africa
- ➤ Auroch domestication (*Bos primigenius*)

## Pastoral numbers (?)

- > 200-500M pastoralists
- > 30-40M nomadic pastoralists

## **Diversity**

> 50 major pastoral societies exist












# Rangelands: Biodiversity Repository

30% biodiversity hotspots

# **Example Narratives**

- ➤ Marginalization narrative: Global rangelands were initially forested, but indigenous peoples degraded them, contributing to extensive rangelands characterized by resource scarcity and variability.
- Counter narrative: Rapid biodiversity loss imperils planetary function, but the vast biodiversity of expansive rangelands can maintain a safe operating space for humanity.



## **Counter Narrative Critical**

Power of a counter narrative emphasizing global rangeland value to planetary stewardship cannot be overemphasized.

- > Transform intergovernmental organizations
- > Justify societal support of rangeland biodiversity
- > Empower pastoralists with greater self-governance
