There is a variety of services at this one location that make it easy to obtain information. I continue to be amazed at the amount of leadership provided by this association on behalf of production agriculture with contacts at all levels of government, public institution, commercial industry, and other entities. Jeff Nunley, Executive Director, and the board members are a great asset for cotton and grain producers of South Texas.

## PESTICIDE COLLECTION EVENT

Two locations have been designated where unwanted pesticides (herbicides, insecticides, fungicides, rodenticides, nematocides, bactericides, plant growth regulators, harvest aid chemicals), gasoline/diesel fuel, transmission fluid, antifreeze, lead-acid batteries, and oil/oil filters, and grease can be

disposed free of charge. Oil filters will be limited to two 55 gallon drums per participant. For quantities larger than a pickup load, call 512-239-3143 or the county agent to ensure they are prepared to handle the material. The collection day is open to Texas residents who apply pesticides or other agricultural chemicals for the production of agricultural products in Texas. **Items that are not accepted** include tires, propane/butane tanks larger than 20-lb capacity, explosives, fertilizers or other nutrient materials, or ammunition. Wastes from dealers or distributors, applicators regulated by the Texas Pest Control Service, or oil products from businesses that change oil for a fee cannot be accepted.

The locations include Old Jackson County Fairgrounds, 73 FM 822 in Edna on Tuesday, October 26, and San Patricio County Fairgrounds, 219 W. 5<sup>th</sup> Street, Sinton on Thursday, October 28. **Make sure not to confuse the dates and locations.** The contact for the Edna location will be Michael Hiller, County Extension Agent (361-782-3312) and the contact for the Sinton location will be Duane Campion, County Extension Agent (361-364-6234). ## COTTON DESTRUCTION CRITICALLY IMPORTANT

Much progress has been made in boll weevil eradication in the South Texas/Winter Garden Zone this season, but there are several problem areas and isolated field problems in the Zone. As for the rest of the State, many western zones have been declared functionally eradicated. In the eastern areas through September 26, 2010 very few boll weevils were detected in the Northern Blacklands, the Southern Blacklands are at the lowest numbers in history (problem area along the Brazos River), and only one boll weevil has been captured in the Upper Coastal Bend zone in over a year.

It leaves The Lower Rio Grande Valley and South Texas/Winter Garden Zones with more significant problems which are the main reasons that **a major effort by everyone should be made to completely destroy cotton stalks as quick as possible. I cannot emphasize how important cotton stalk destruction is for the southern part of the State as we are in the subtropics and boll weevil eradication has been very difficult for that reason.** The Valley had been making good progress until a hurricane and tropical storm came, flooding of fields occurred, and field treatments ceased in Mexico just across the Rio Grande River all of which have contributed to increased boll weevil numbers.

Our situation could also deteriorate if stalks are not removed. Please go to great effort to remove cotton stalks; it will payoff in the long run

with less insecticide cost and potential for higher yields. If the boll weevil had been in the picture this season it is doubtful that production would have been near as high as experienced. My estimate of yield increase due to the lack of boll weevil damage over the past few years has been about 125 lb lint/acre. This season that figure is surely much higher.

### WHERE HAVE ALL THE GREENBUGS GONE?

For several years greenbug numbers have been very low in sorghum grown in the Coastal Bend and other areas as well. Some outbreaks did occur in wheat, but even there during the past few years, damage has generally been light. Dr. Bonnie Pendleton, West Texas A&M University, suspects that the newer seed treatments may have helped manage the greenbug; however, there is substantial acreage that is not treated with these seed treatments. Seed companies have also been hard at work developing sorghums extremely resistant to greenbug according to Dr. Pendleton.

A few years ago Dr. Pendleton biotyped greenbugs from South Texas, and they were all biotype I, as were the other greenbugs from other areas in Texas and Kansas. Possibly, biotype C no longer exists in the field. Biotype E is still common, and biotype K doesn't seem to have really taken hold. Biotypes G and H are found on wild grasses, and there may be other biotypes on various grasses that have not attained pest status.

We know that the greenbug can do wild things, so don't put it past them to eventually cause severe damage when weather and other conditions are favorable for increase.

### POTENTIAL FOR YELLOW SUGARCANE APHID & WHITE GRUB IN 2011

Only isolated infestations of yellow sugarcane aphid (YSA) were observed on sorghum along the Gulf Coast in 2010. It would not be a good idea to forget about this insect when planting sorghum in 2011. It may help to observe johnsongrass for YSA and the greenbug (discussed above) in late winter and early spring as an indicator of what might occur in sorghum.

Fields in which white grubs were found in 2010 are likely to be infested in 2011. If corn or sorghum are to be planted in these fields it would be a good idea to inspect soil to determine their presence before planting so appropriate action can be taken.

### HONEY BEE ATTACKS INCREASE IN SOUTH TEXAS

Plant life has been more abundant with the excellent moisture conditions, which means more flowering plants producing pollen and nectar. Under such circumstances honey bee populations have rebounded from very low numbers in 2009. Increasing numbers are expected for at least the spring and early summer of 2011. The fact is that in South Texas, the chance of wild bees exhibiting Africanized traits is greater than 90%. We have already had many more reports of bee stinging incidents than any year I can recall. People need to be aware of the situation and be thinking about what to do to avoid a bee attack and what to do if an attack does occur.

Many of the incidents involve use of mowers, shredders, brush removal equipment, or drainage ditch cleaning. Many people that do this type work have learned to have a vehicle closer to the work activity than was needed before the Africanized bee arrived.

It should be noted that a traveling swarm of bees or those working flowers are not likely to cause any harm at all. The danger is when bees are disturbed in their hive where brood is being reared and honey and pollen is stored. They attack to protect the hive. ### INTERESTING INSECTS

Researchers at the Boyce Thompson Institute for Plant Research and Cornell University published interesting findings about "apathetic" aphids in the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*, August 3, 2010. Under normal conditions when a ladybug captures and bites into an aphid the victim releases an alarm pheromone called beta-farnesene, prompting nearby aphids to walk away or drop off the plant. However, when aphids are raised on plants genetically engineered to emit beta-farnesene, they become accustomed to the chemical and no longer respond to it – even when a predator is present – making them easy prey.
