YOUTH HIGHLIGHT

STATE ARCHERY GAMES











The Texas 4-H State Games Archery event takes place in San Antonio in July. This was my first time going. It was about a 4-hour car drive, but it was worth it. There was plenty of time to do other stuff in San Antonio while we were there, so it was also like a mini vacation. It's summer in Texas, so it was already hot, but there wasn't really a "facility," so there was no air conditioning either. The entire event was outdoors, but there were awnings to provide shade for Wand and Modified 600. Clout and Field were insanely hot! Bring extra, extra water if you go next year.

I did three types of archery on three different days: Clout, Wand, and Field. I did not do Modified 600 or 3D. Clout was really fun, but extremely tiring as I had to go back and forth in the sun to retrieve arrows. But it was the most rewarding and my favorite out of the three events I did. The target was about 70 to 80 meters away, and it was on the ground, so you really needed to aim high enough or your arrows just wouldn't get there. It took about 4 to 5 hours.

Field archery, which is similar to 3D but with paper targets, was the most difficult for me - so hot and hardly any trees to hide under. Personally, my bow, a Genesis NASP, was not powerful enough for those 30, 35, and sometimes, 40-meters-away targets. That was just for intermediate distances; seniors had to shoot further some of the time! Again, it was super hot, but it was still really neat. There was a target on the other side of a little stream, so you had to stand on a platform and shoot across the stream. If you drop your bow, it's gone, for sure. At one point, there was a huge deer running through the field. He got about halfway before he realized he needed to get out of there! That event also took about 5 hours.

Wand was interesting. The target was just a super tall, skinny, bale with a blue field and two thin yellow lines sandwiching a thin red line in the center. The red stripe was an X, the yellow stripes were counted as hits, and the blue mat was counted as misses. Yellow was what you wanted, because the red X was mainly for tiebreaking. It was a lot of fun once I got used to it. My favorite part of Wand was the fact that there was shade. Wand was pretty straightforward and only took about 1 hour.

Before the awards ceremony, the seniors that graduated got to do a t-shirt shoot where they put a shirt of their choice on the bale and then shot at it. And then their friends and family got to shoot at it, too. That was pretty cool. One crazy thing that happened during the t-shirt shoot was a little dust devil, like a mini dust tornado, whipped up and knocked down a couple of bales and swirled around the archers.

That's the basic rundown of the State Games event. The best part for me was that I placed in every event. I really enjoyed it, and I highly recommend going next year.

THE EDIBLE GARDEN FOR ALL

Thanks to a grant from the American Rescue Plan, the Dallas County Extension Office is excited to launch a new initiative: the Urban Farming Project. This project is designed to address the nutrition gap in fresh produce access within Dallas County, particularly affecting communities impacted by poverty, cultural and ethnic diversity, and the COVID-19 pandemic. The Urban Farming Project will facilitate hands-on learning at the RB1 Urban Farm. Participants from low-resource schools and communities heavily impacted by the pandemic will have the opportunity to learn about gardening and nutrition through organized busing. Additionally, AgriLife Extension will introduce a mobile education unit to

deliver the Edible Garden for All (EGA) series educational program throughout Dallas County.

This initiative aims to enhance participants' understanding of fresh food cultivation, environmental stewardship, and the importance of accessible food production. It will benefit both youth and adults by increasing their food-growing literacy and appreciation for healthy food choices.

The project's first phase involves creating educational programs covering various growing methods, including indoor and outdoor techniques. A hydroponics system has already been set up in the North Dallas Government Building, with plans to expand to RB1 and South Dallas locations.
