

WILDFIRE PREPARATION CHECKLIST

Important Things to Remember -

Drought and high winds make a perfect combination for wildfires. However, there are things you can do for your home, property and livestock to reduce the damage caused by wildfire. Set aside the time to discuss these points with your family (and landlord as appropriate).

- ▶ Plan before a wildfire happens
- Never get in front of an oncoming wildfire
- Interfering with, obstructing, impeding the progress of, molesting, or assaulting firefighters in the performance of their duties is a felony in Oklahoma (Statute 21-1217)

HOME AND FAMILY

Important phone numbers ready - fire, sheriff, neighbors
Check insurance coverage: amount and extent; home, buildings and items within
Make a plan so family members and workers know what to do and where to go
Choose a common contact in another town as the communication relay
Meeting place predetermined for your family and workers
Important papers in a safety deposit box or fireproof safe
Keep an inventory of all household, barn, shop and other outbuildings with pictures, video, and receipts
Have a kit of essentials - flashlights, spare chargers, water, etc.
Prescription medications should be ready for travel

PROPERTY

Remove flammable materials (plants, etc.) within 5 ft. of home
Keep yard around home mowed short
Trim up any trees that have limbs or branches within 6-10 foot of ground that are within 5-30 foot of home
Remove flammable materials within 5 foot of barns, shops, and outbuildings
Keep windows and doors closed on barns, shops, and other outbuildings

Clean off flammable material/fluids from equipment

- Store equipment on gravel, bare ground or areas mowed/ grazed short
- Frequently remove wind-blown debris, such as tumbleweeds, from around buildings and equipment

LIVESTOCK AND FEED

- ☐ Don't store all hay in one area
- ☐ Store hay on gravel, bare ground or areas mowed/grazed short
 - Store hay away from homes, barns, buildings or equipment
- $\hfill \Box$ Check with insurance policy on hay coverage limitations
- ☐ Place mineral feeders in pasture corners to create trampled areas for livestock to gather
- ☐ Feed along fence lines or corners to create livestock refuge areas
 - Make a plan for animals held in small areas
- Release stalled horses into nearby pens or pastures when safety and time allows
- Move herds to green fields/short-grazed areas to improve their ability to move away from fire when safety and time allows.
- Have a plan if fence cutting becomes necessary, including conversations with those with neighboring pastures.
